Spolate

It's been another great summer in Dewey Beach!

Let's talk, Rehoboth Beach Fire Department donations, flood projects, SCHMP, dog waste on the beach, and dune crossings.

Our police and lifeguards have kept us safe this summer but there is another team that also helps protect us, our Rehoboth Beach Fire Department! Please contribute to our annual RBVFC Fundraiser. The Town of Dewey Beach will match very donation that is made. <u>Donate today!</u>

The town is currently working on 3 flood mitigation projects on Read Ave bayside, Jersey Street 1st and 2nd block, and Van Dyke Ave bayside. On Read Ave, the town is working with the Army Corps of Engineers on a proposed pump station project. On Jersey Street, the town is working with Beacon Engineering to move water off the lowest parts of the streets. This will be accomplished by either putting in storm or french drains in those areas. On Van Dyke Ave, the town has submitted a grant request to DNREC to study possible projects on the storm drain outlets that run into the bay. More information about these projects can be obtained from the Town Manager.

Our Building Official Daune Hinks continues to do an outstanding job handling the hundreds of building permits that are submitted every year to the town. After a lot of research and hard work, Daune has ensured the town meets the requirements to participate in the Sussex County Hazardous Mitigation Program (SCHMP). This means if the town should experience a major flood event, we meet the requirements to receive funding from FEMA and state agencies. Thank you, Daune, for all your continued hard work to accomplish this goal!

We love our dogs in Dewey, and want to continue allowing them on the beach. Recently there has been an increase of dog owners not cleaning up their dog's waste on the beach. The owners are either not picking it up at all, or leaving it in a bag. The town supplies doggie bags at every dune crossing. There is no excuse for not cleaning up after your dog. If this should continue, and dog owners don't clean up after their dogs, restrictions for dogs on the beach may need to be put in place. Please clean up after your dog!

We are always looking at ways to improve the town's appearance. At each dune entrance, there is opportunity to improve the conditions and appearance. If you would like to see two great examples of improving the dune entrances, please see Bellevue and West Streets. These projects were funded and maintained by property owners on these streets, in coordination with the town. They look great! Let's Talk Trash

Our current residential trash contract expires in the spring of 2025. Town staff begins the work now to assess the needs of our residents and homeowners, and decide if changes need to be made in the collection process of waste and recycling. We want to hear your thoughts! But first, in order to move forward, it's important to understand how far we've come.



Trash & Recycling Committee

In 2016, the Trash & Recycling Committee was formed to tackle trash problems in town. There were a number of concerns:

- Residents had the choice of securing their own trash provider. While this was great to have the freedom to price shop, it had many drawbacks.
 Streets became overrun with different trash collection companies, driving around 24/7, all on different schedules. It was noisy, congested, and created excessive wear and tear on our streets.
- Without proper oversight, some residents decided not to pay for trash collection, and instead disposed of household waste in public trash cans. This resulted in many overfilled cans on street corners, and trash blowing around town.
- There was no mandatory valet service for rental properties. Cans were left in the public right-of-way by tenants for extended periods of time, overfilling with trash.

In the end, the committee recommended to the Town Council to enter a contract with a single-source vendor for residential properties (only one company would serve the town for residential trash and recycling). This vendor would provide cans for each property. Property owners who rented their home were required to secure valet service - this would prevent cans being left in the right-of-way, or not being put out for collection. These changes greatly improved the issues related to trash.



Where Are We Now?

In 2016, the bidding process for a single-source trash and recycling vendor yielded only one applicant. While the company has been bought out numerous times, we've continued with the original service contract.

Considerations...

- Current pricing is as follows:
 - In Season (twice/week trash collection, once/week recycling collection): \$31/mo basic;
 \$47.12/mo valet
 - Off Season (once/week trash collection, biweekly recycling collection): \$26.57/mo basic; \$37.31/mo valet
- From the start of the contract in 2017 to 2024, homeowners have experienced a price increase of less than \$1 per year.
- Property owners may opt to cancel service temporarily when their home is not occupied.
- Arguably, Dewey Beach trash collection is not a sought-after contract. The amount of valet service, narrow, crowded/busy streets, and traffic congestion makes collection exceptionally difficult.
- In order to lower pricing, changes will likely need to be made. For instance, this could include fixed, yearly pricing for all properties, with no option to "opt out."

The Dewey in Bloom initiative doesn't just make the town more beautiful. It's also highly beneficial:



Gardens serve to protect and nourish our bird population. Small birds are known to take shelter in large container gardens, and will also feed on nectar and seeds from flowers (we planted plenty of zinnias - one of the birds favorites).



Save the bees and butterflies! Pollinators are essential to our ecosystem. They cross-pollinate 90% of wild plants and 30% of the world's food crops. Climate change, pesticides, and habitat destruction continue to threaten the world's pollinators. Planting varieties of flowering plants helps to provide both food and protection for our bees and butterflies.



Community gardening projects, including container gardens, promote social cohesion. While the act of gardening is shown to reduce stress and enhance physical wellbeing, merely being around plants and trees is beneficial for all of us. The presence of community gardens is also shown to reduce crime in heavily-populated areas. Though the reasoning isn't completely understood, we know that people tend to show a greater respect for an area that has been enhanced and maintained with trees, shrubs and plants.


Another gift to our community! We're investigating the option of placing a planter in town filled with fresh herbs for all to enjoy.




new bloom boxes

Back by popular demand! We wish to add more bloom boxes throughout town. We're seeking volunteer teams to <u>sponsor</u>, plant, and maintain a bloom box.





The most recent severe flood happened just north of the Inlet Bridge, where the ocean breached the dunes, temporarily shutting down Coastal Highway. This occurred during an overnight storm on August 18th, just one day before the full moon. This is the second time this year that the inlet beach has flooded. The first was March 26th - one day after the full moon. After the latest flood, DNREC and DelDOT began emergency repair, placing rip rap (large stones) to help protect the roadway from future flooding. This is a temporary measure, organizations will be evaluating section of beach at the conclusion of hurricane season. The most likely scenario will involve beach replenishment and adding height to the existing dunes.



Those who live on the coast know that a full or new moon phase creates higher tides. When these phases coincide with

a storm, we've got trouble.

While the tides are created by the gravitational tug-of-war between the Earth, Sun, and Moon, it's the Moon that creates the best-known tides. And when the Earth, Moon and Sun align – at full moon and new moon – gravitational pulls combine to create higher high tides, and lower low tides. While these "lunar" tides are already high, even a minor storm event that coincides with the full or new moon creates problems in our area.

The kneejerk response to flooded streets or a steep drop off on the beach is "fix it now!" When on vacation, no one wants to be inconvenienced with a closed street, or a difficult walk across a stormbeaten beach.

The fact is, nature gives, and nature takes away. A good example of this is a nor'easter seemingly stealing away the width of a beach, only for it to slowly <u>rebuild itself</u> over time.

Defending our infrastructure, while minimizing negative impacts on the environment, is a balancing act. We like to say, trying to fight a riptide is useless. But we can prepare for it's inevitable arrival, and make a plan to survive it.

Our Climate Change and Infrastructure Committees continue to work alongside our Town Council to plan and prepare for storm events and high tides. Keep an eye on our Meeting Calendar to learn how we're working to protect Dewey Beach.


